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#### **The Cannabis Act**

Has been passed by the Canadian House of Commons

Passed in the Senate June 7, 2018

As soon as amendments are approved, it will receive Royal Assent and it will be law within 8-10 weeks














#### WHY LEGALIZE CANNABIS?



# The prohibition paradox

ILLEGAL, PROHIBITION: use is driven underground, criminal elements increase danger LEGAL, REGULATED: controlled regulation allows for safe use and moderates danger levels

LEGAL, UNREGULATED: no safety measures or regulations mean danger increases





# A public health approach



"In taking a public health approach to the regulation of cannabis, the Task Force proposes measures that will maintain and improve the health of Canadians by minimizing the harms associated with cannabis use."

# **Regulation highlights**



- National minimum purchase age of 18
- Plain packaging, mandatory labelling
- Public guidance for lower-risk use
- Public education campaign

# TRACE research program

- Youth cannabis use exists on a spectrum
- Youth are skeptical of 'biased' / heavy-handed messaging
- Stigmatizing or shaming youth for cannabis use is unproductive
- Youth are actively engaged in their own harm prevention strategies

# 10 conversation principles



- 1. Education based on evidence rather than fear
- 2. Non-judgmental, interactive, open dialogue
- 3. Meaningful inclusion
- 4. Delivery by a trained facilitator or peer
- 5. Start early with age-appropriate content





# 10 conversation principles



- 6. Support & guidance to parents for open conversations
- 7. Include harm reduction
- 8. Specific context tailored education
- 9. Availability of ongoing education
- 10. Overlapping issues: racism, social justice, stigma





# The bottom line

- Legal regulation is an opportunity to have honest conversations
- Focus on evidence-based drug education for youth
- Prioritize youth voices and experiences: education must resonate
- Include prevention and harm reduction

# Cannabis and international students







- Speak with your insurance provider TODAY
- Evaluate your current drug & alcohol policy; assess need for updates
- Work with your school personnel and homestay providers to develop rational consequences for students who violate policy







## Homestays

- Update both your host applications and drug & alcohol
- Keep resources accessible and current
- Understand your school partners' drug and alcohol policies







- Be realistic and honest
- In orientation, use high level information & language students understand
- Be prepared with resources to keep accessible all year
- Be clear with your students regarding consequences of policy violation







#### Parents/Agents

- Inform, but don't over-inform: gauge level of interest first
- Accurately represent the new legislation
- Be prepared with websites/resources for further learning
- Be clear about expectations and consequences for students
