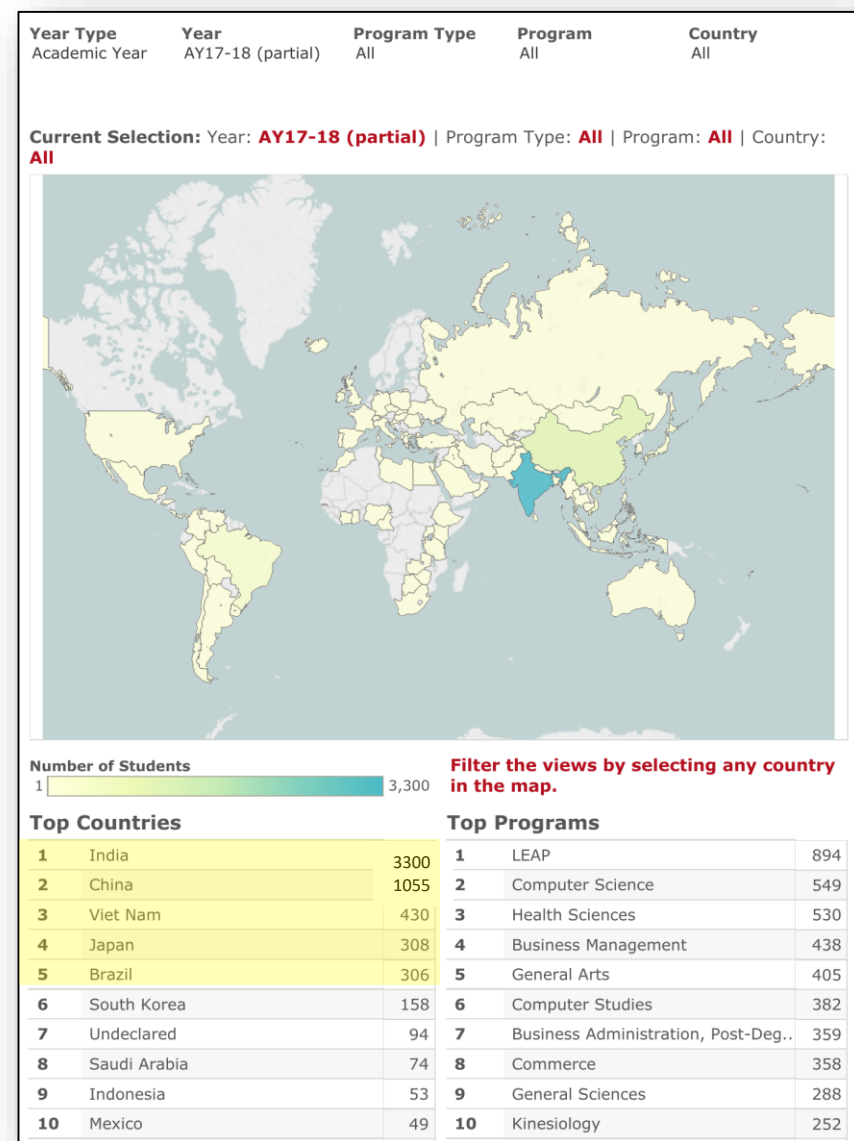

# The Need: Increases in International Student #s



- 2013-14: Total students 2189
  - Regular Studies
    - 1360 - Non-Post Degree
    - 19 – Post Degree
  - Continuing Studies
    - 807 – LEAP (ESL)
    - 3 – Other
- 2017-18 (partial): Total students 6295
  - Regular Studies
    - 4519 – Non Post Degree
    - 831 – Post Degree
  - Continuing Studies
    - 894 – LEAP (ESL)
    - 51 – Other

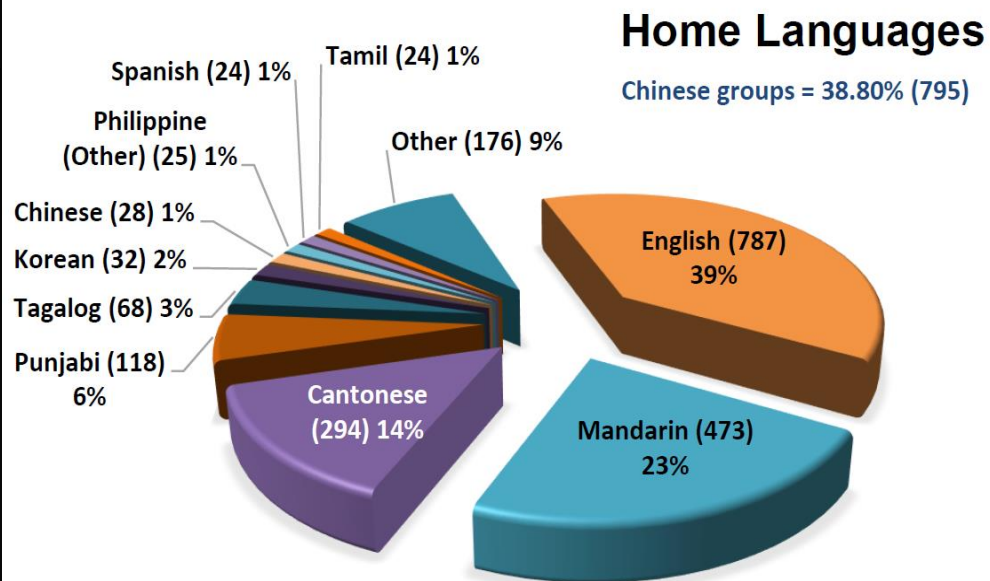
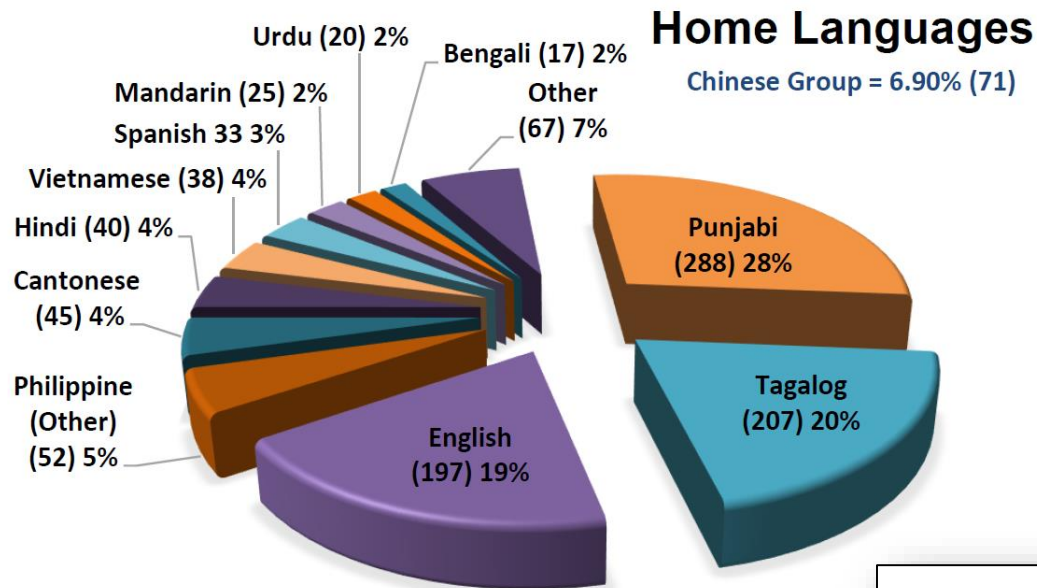
# Need: Change in International Student Demographic – 2013/14 to 2017/18

# The Need: Students' Academic Transitions

- Seeing a change in students
- Students less prepared
- As international student numbers increased, more students seemingly had a tougher time adjusting
- Demographic from our high schools are also changing

# The Need: Faculty

# A Concept: 'Langara 101'

- March 2015: IE made a proposal to then VP Academic for a “Langara 101” course for international students
- Vision:
  - face-to-face
  - for new international students a
  - academic & study skills
  - increasing self-awareness
- Challenges:
  - Did not engage faculty support
  - Model was unsustainable

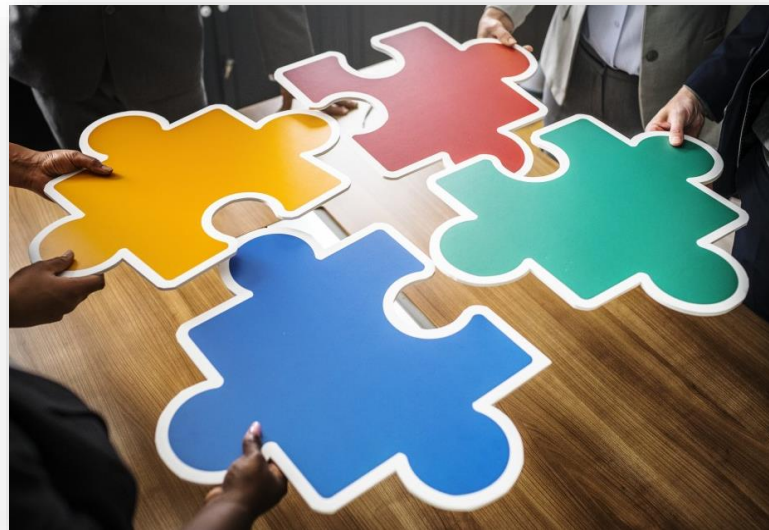

# NEW Concept: Student Success Course

- Development of Langara Student Success Course (LSSC) for **ALL** students
- Faculty/staff engaged in discussion and dialogue
- A proposal was jointly submitted to senior administration and was approved (Faculty & International Education)



# The Concept: What is the LSSC?

- Online course to prepare students for academic life at Langara
- To support all students through their adjustment and transition into post secondary education and develop appropriate academic and life skills for academic success
- Automatic enrollment for all first-year students (Opt-out vs Opt-in)
- Free, non-credit

# Comparison of average grade from lab midterm in Fall 2015 to Fall 2016

BIOL 1115	Fall 2015 (4 sections) n=135	Fall 2016 (6 Sections) n=203
LSSC	N/A	72.0%
Lab Midterm	61.7%	65.7%
Overall GPA	2.1 (all sections)	2.4 (all sections)

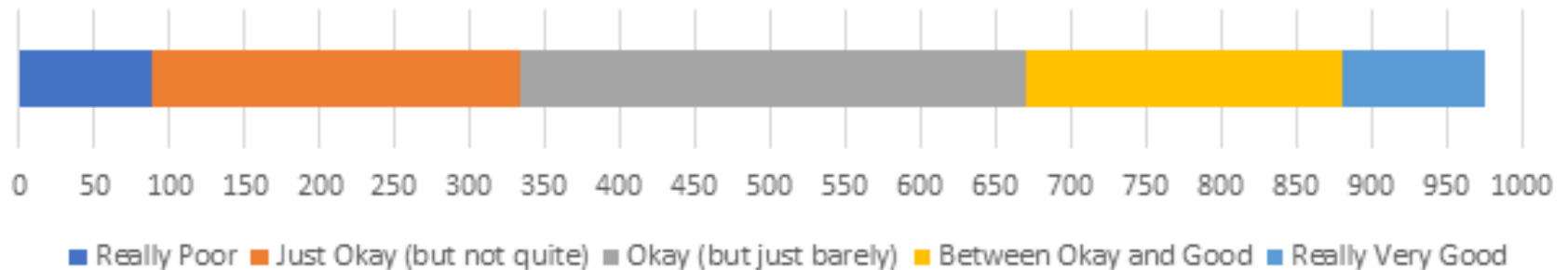

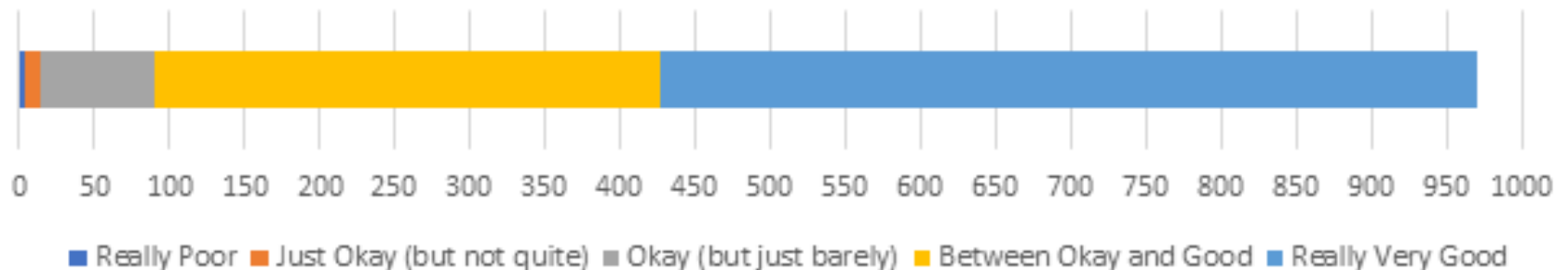

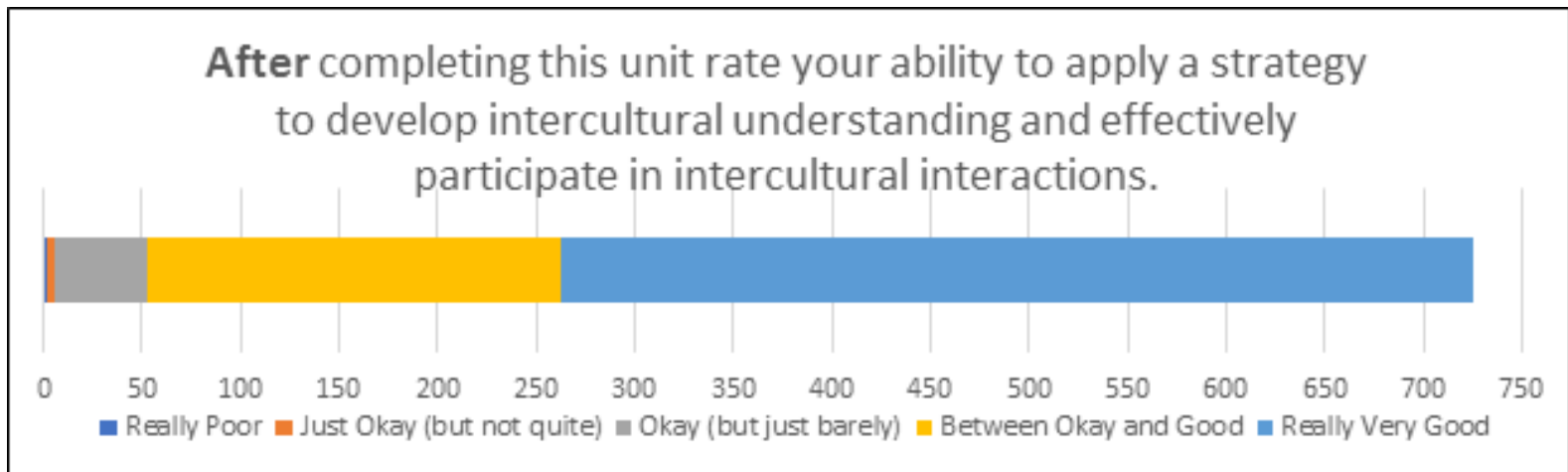
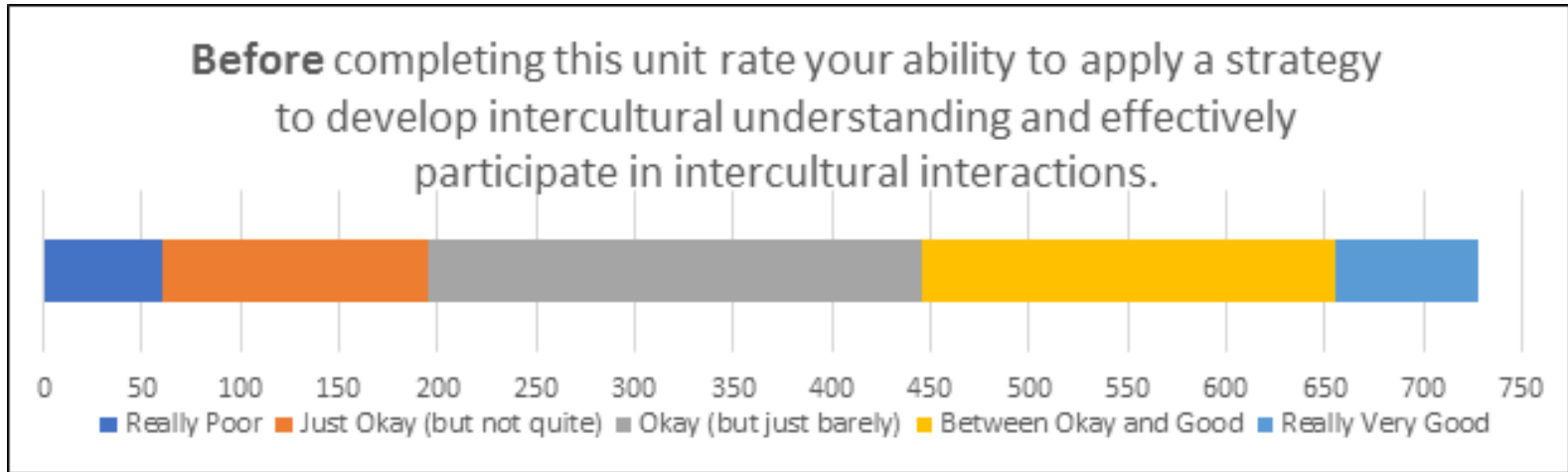
**Before** completing this unit rate your ability to calculate your time commitments over a typical week.

# Pilot Phase & New Developments Fall 2018

- Piloted in 6 semesters from fall 2016 to summer 2018
- Delivered to approximately 3700 students
  - Biology,
  - Computer Science and Information Systems,
  - Langara School of Management,
  - Modern Languages, Economics,
  - Psychology
  - Web and Mobile App Design and Development
- 2.5% – 5% of grade
- This summer, the course will move out of pilot phase and be delivered to all new students starting in fall 2018

# Fall 2018 - In Conjunction with New Student Orientation (NSO)

- Delivered pre-arrival
- Free
- Non-credit course
- All new incoming student starting in Fall 2018
- In conjunction with the New Student Orientation (NSO) and Office for Student Engagement
- Through this combined effort, we hope to increase a **sense of belonging**

# Incentives and Budget

- Draw at NSO for \$1000 tuition credits
  - Attend NSO
  - Successfully complete LSSC by Aug 20<sup>th</sup>
- \$50 Gift Card to Bookstore for all students that successfully complete course
  - Gift card to be picked up at the Office for Student Engagement (HUB)
- Overall budget of around \$500,000
  - Includes funding for a faculty position and instructional assistant

1. Find your champions and give them resources
